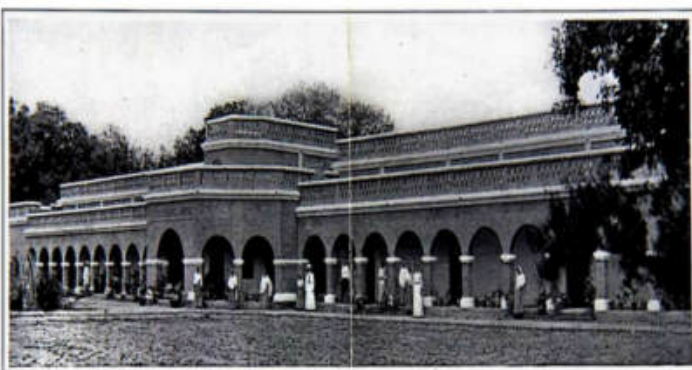
## *Introduction of Broadwell Christian Hospital, Fatehpur*



Broadwell Christian Hospital, Fatehpur, was established in 1909 by Women's Union Missionary Society with a vision to bring compassionate medical care to the people of the region. From its humble beginnings from village and roadside clinics, the hospital has grown into a trusted center for healthcare, serving patients irrespective of caste, creed or financial background. For more than a century it has been committed to quality treatment, community health services, and palliative care, while upholding Christian values of love and service.

### *Location*

The hospital is situated in Fatehpur, Uttar Pradesh, between the rivers Ganges and Yamuna along the Kanpur- Prayagraj (erstwhile Allahabad) National Highway NH 2. It is around 70 km from Kanpur and 120km from Prayagraj, making it an accessible healthcare facility for both rural and semi-urban populations across the district and neighboring areas.

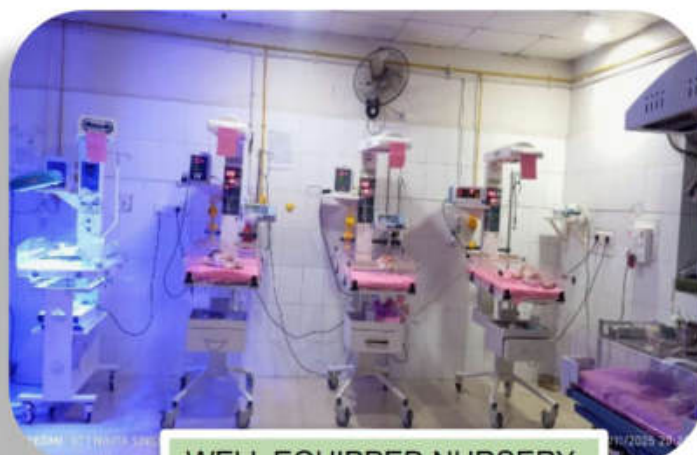

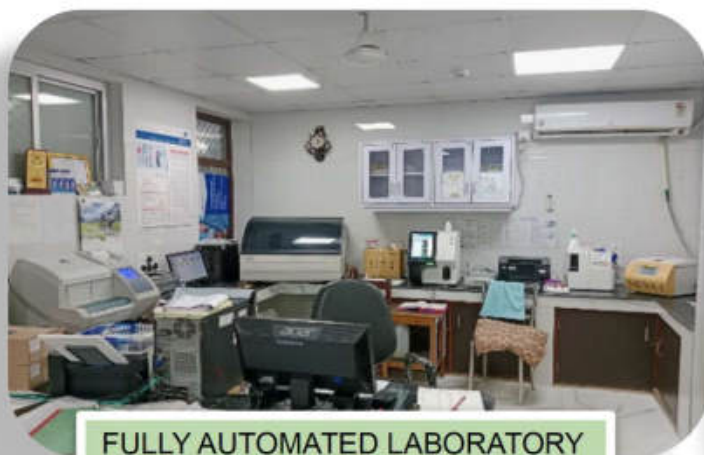

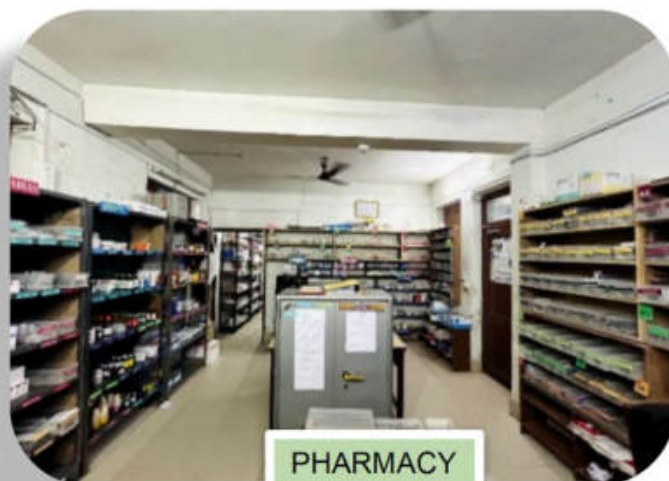

## WHERE WE WORK:

**Background:** Uttar Pradesh (UP) is one of the 4 largest states in India with a geographical spread of 2,40,928 km and is divided into 75 districts.<sup>1</sup> It is also one of the most populous states in the country with a population of 19.98 crores<sup>2</sup> and is projected to increase over 23 Crores by 2021. In the State, 77.73% of the population resides in rural areas, while 22.26% in urban areas. Agriculture remains the backbone of the State's economy with 77.73% of the population living in rural areas.

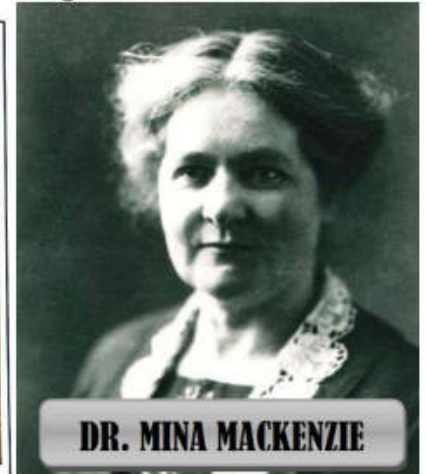
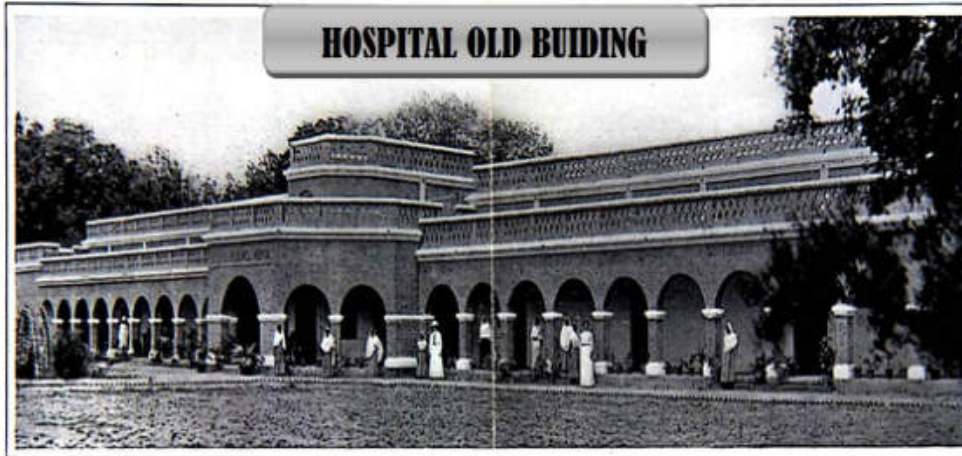
**2. Fatehpur District:** Fatehpur district, located in Uttar Pradesh state, spans an area of 4,152 square kilometers and is home to a population of 2,632,733 (Census, 2011). The district's administrative centre is Fatehpur city, situated on the banks of the Ganges and Yamuna rivers, with Bhitaura and Asani ghats being considered sacred sites. It falls within Allahabad Division and lies between the cities of Allahabad and Kanpur, connected by railway and road networks. The district spanning an area of 4,152 square Kms, it is divided into three sub-divisions: Fatehpur, Bindki, and Khaga (Fig2. District Map). These sub-divisions are intricately organized into 13 development blocks, namely, Airaya, Amauli, Asothar, Bahua, Bhitaura, Deomai, Dhata, Haswa, Hathgaon, Khajuha, Malwan, Teliyani, and Vijayipur. The district sustains a population of 2,632,733 individuals, with 1,384,722 being male and 1,248,011 females. It encompasses a total of 1,521 villages and is administratively structured with three main revenue divisions, incorporating 13 blocks, two Palika Nagar Parishads, and five Nagar Panchayats

# HISTORY OF BCH

The concept of Broadwell Christian Hospital took place in the year 1894 when the founding society, Women's Union Missionary Society (WUMS) received a donation of USD 10,000.00 from Mr. Samuel J Broadwell of Cincinnati, in memory of his wife. The official date of establishment, as per records, is 25th November 1909, as Lily Lytle Broadwell Memorial Dispensary. This project was started by WUMS, which sent single women missionaries to foreign lands. The intention of the hospital was to provide medical care through the hospital as well as serving the poor and needy in villages and through roadside clinics.



Dr. Jemima Mackenzie, Mrs. Owen were the ones who started the project in Fatehpur by the name of Lily Lytle Broadwell Memorial Dispensary. After Dr. Jemima, it was Dr. Annabel McEwen and in the year 1930, Dr. Gertrude Smith took the responsibility to lead the team. During Dr. Smith's tenure, the hospital added 27 beds for female patients. Next in the leadership list was Dr. B. W Lyall & Mrs. Irene Lyall, who played a major role in the development of this hospital. After the retirement of Dr. Lyall in the year 1978 due to ill health, the hospital again fell into crisis.



In 1973, the hospital was handed over to Emmanuel Hospital Association.

Some of the key leaders who served in Fatehpur during this period were Mr. M.O Varghese, Dr. Samson Ratnaraj, Mr. Raut, Dr. Pushpa Raut, Dr. Deepti Singh, Dr. P V Cherian, Dr. Sara Cherian, Dr. Ajit Thomas, Dr. Usha John, Dr. Supriya, Dr. Asangla, Dr. Tony, Dr. Swati Singh. Later on, Dr. Juni Chungath and Mrs. Helen Paul took charge of the hospital and things went well till 2007, when, once again, the hospital was left with no doctors. Dr. Sujith Varghese Thomas and Dr. Sunitha Varghese took over the leadership in the year 2008 and they worked hard toward the growth of the hospital with a renewed vision as well as community development. Dr. Sujith handed over the baton to Dr. Jesudoss Antony on 1st April, 2018. In 2023 when hospital was going through a tough time Mrs. Helen Paul took over the leadership and in November it was handed over to Mrs. Merin Thomas.

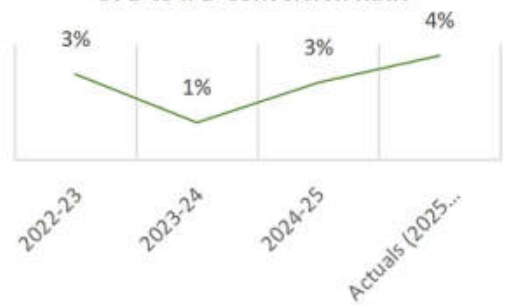

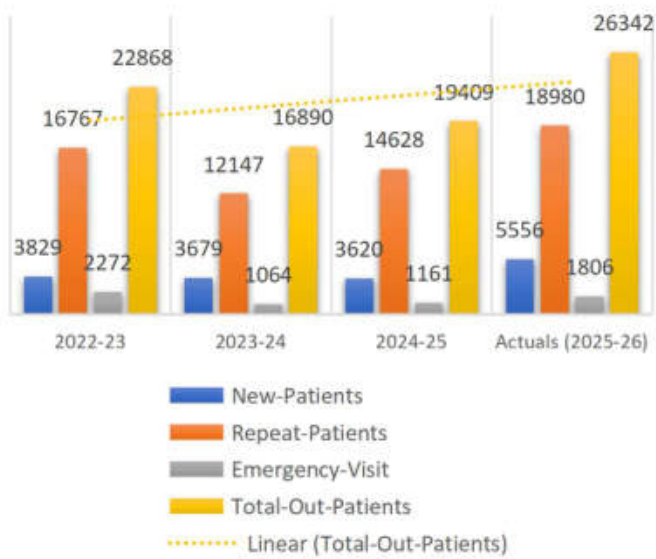

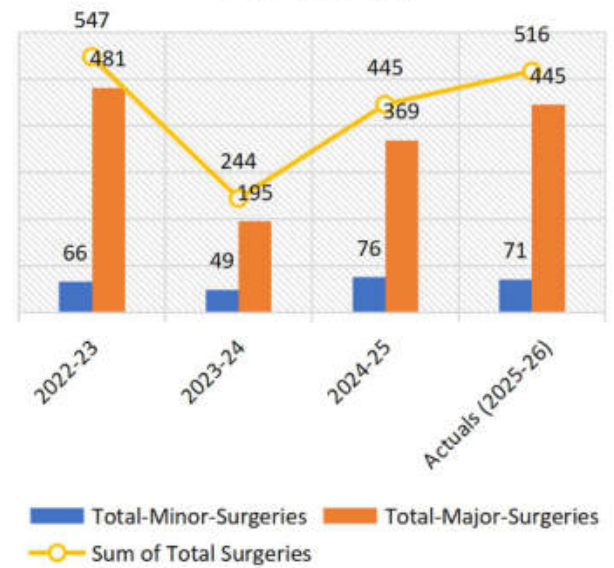
### OPD to IPD Conversion Ratio



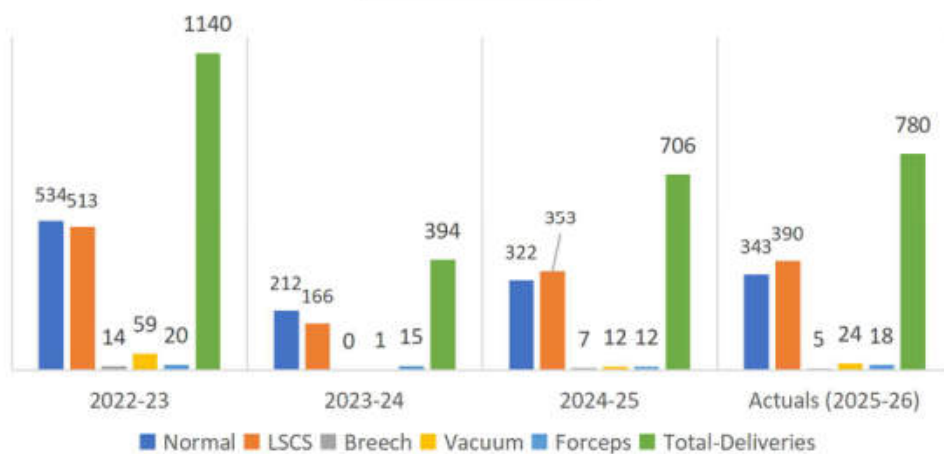

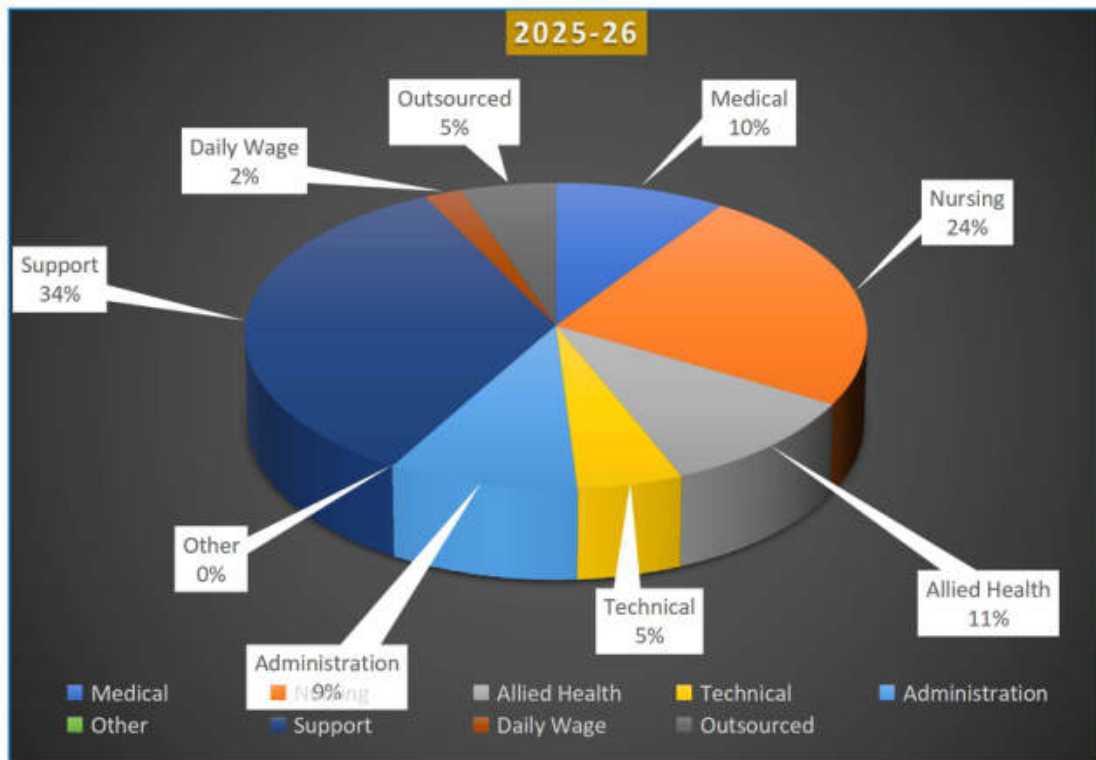

## MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT REPORT



### ***Dr. Ricky Mathew***

Greetings in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.

The year 2025–26 was a year of steady growth and progress for our hospital. Building on the achievements of previous years, we witnessed an increase in patient services across multiple departments. During the year, the hospital recorded more than 1,600 admissions, 26,000 outpatients consultations, and 780 deliveries, reflecting the trust placed in us by the community we serve. Our core departments, including Obstetrics & Gynaecology, General Medicine, Radiology, Physical Medicine & Rehabilitation (PMR), and Dentistry, continued to provide dedicated and quality healthcare services. We were also privileged to receive the support of visiting specialists such as Dr. Alexander Daniel, Dr. Arpit Mathew, Dr. John Oommen, and Dr. Benjamin George, who conducted surgical camps throughout the year. Their expertise greatly benefited our patients. We are thankful to Dr. Arun, Dr. Anita David, and Dr. Malarvizhi for their valuable contributions, including cataract surgeries and clinical support during critical periods.

A significant milestone this year was the addition of a laparoscopic surgery unit, which has expanded our surgical capabilities and enabled many patients to receive advanced treatment closer to home.

In March, we welcomed a group of students from Believers Church Medical College Hospital (BCMCH), accompanied by Dr. Reena Jose. Their visit provided valuable learning opportunities, including exposure to community-based healthcare through participation in palliative care home visits.

Through the generous support of Helping Hands for Hospitals and the Mina Fund, we were able to procure important medical equipment, including a laparoscopy unit, laboratory equipment, cardiac monitors, OT lights, and a dental implant unit. These additions have strengthened our ability to provide quality healthcare to the people of Fatehpur, especially those who are poor and underserved.

Our outreach initiatives also continued throughout the year. Lady doctors visited Primary Health Centres (PHCs) to support High-Risk ANC Clinics, while our palliative care team remained committed to providing compassionate care, support, and hope to patients and families through home visits.

We are pleased to welcome Dr. Mekha to the Dental Department and Dr. Prerna as Junior Medical Officer. At the same time, we bid farewell to Dr. Aaron, who is pursuing higher studies, and we wish him God's blessings in his future endeavors.

As we reflect on the past year, we thank God for His faithfulness, guidance, and provision. Despite challenges, His grace has enabled us to continue serving the community with compassion and excellence. We look forward to another year of dedicated service, seeking to glorify Him through our work and ministry.

## *Testimony:*

Mrs. P was a young lady who was brought to us with a history of having had multiple convulsions during the day. We found out that she was pregnant, and as with many expecting mothers had had no proper check-ups. Upon examining her, we found her to have high blood pressure and the diagnosis of eclampsia was staring at our face: a preventable cause of maternal and fatal mortality.

Her baby was active in the womb with a healthy heart and the decision was made to operate on her immediately to save the mother and child. Mrs. P was wheeled into the operation theatre and caesarean section carried out under general anaesthesia. The surgery went uneventfully but she did not recover her consciousness as we would have expected. Hence, we had to continue to keep her on ventilator after wheeling her out. High BP can sometimes cause damage to the brain which wears out after a while.

Over the next two days, we attempted to keep her blood pressure under control and also administer medicines to reduce her brain swelling. Even after the BP was brought under control, she remained low on her sensorium. When further examination revealed that she would need a brain imaging to diagnose her pathology, she was referred to a higher centre while still being intubated. The timely referral allowed her to reach a private hospital in Kanpur where she was managed and she gradually recovered.

The story of Mrs. P is yet another story of a woman whose medical condition was avoidable if she had taken her check-ups seriously. Often pregnant patients believe that they can stay at home till “labour pains” come. An ultrasound here and there is considerable adequate maternal care by the local community. By the grace of God, both Mrs. P and her child were saved, but we need to be concerned about the several such mothers and their babies who are not so fortunate to reach health care facilities in time.

## NURSING SUPERINTENDENT REPORT



### ***Mrs. Shabnam Lahari***

I extend my greetings to you all.

I am thankful to God Almighty for blessing 21 years of my service in Broadwell Christian Hospital. God's grace has been evident in weal and woe.

It brings me immense delight to write the annual report 2025-26 from the Nursing Department. The report itself is a testimony of God's presence with us through thick and thin.

#### **1. Staff Overview:**

We are working with a total of 20 nurses with seven ANMs and thirteen GNM's at present. Out of these, two GNM nurses are in palliative team and three are on service obligation. Mr. Akash, one of our GNM staff, has been transferred to Lakhnadon, M.P. In addition to this, we have ten nursing assistants.

#### **2. Education and Training:**

Our department runs regular in-service education every Thursday. These classes are taken by doctors and sometimes by nurses themselves. Three of our staff, Akash, Rajeshwari and Sangeeta Lakra attended palliative workshop in Lalitpur this year.

#### **3. Clinical Services:**

It is a matter of joy and pride that we have dedicated nursing staff who furnish extra service in time of need. In case of an emergency, our staff are quick to render a helping hand even past their working hours. In addition to this, our nurses take the initiative to teach the attendants of the patients how to take care of their patients at home. We are offering home-based care services to the elderly and 'unable to come to hospital' patients. This is done by visiting the patients at their home, doing blood investigations, giving them required medications, suture removal etc. Moreover, they are always willing to embrace new roles, responsibilities and challenges.

#### **4. Challenges and requirements:**

At present, the hospital requires a male O.T. technician. Though the number of patients has increased as compared to last year, a higher influx of patients will be beneficial to the hospital.

## ***Testimony:***

Mrs. A, a staff member, was transferred from another EHA unit to our hospital. After some time of joining the hospital, Mrs. A became pregnant. Her pregnancy was complicated and she required repeated hospitalisations. Routine scans showed a poor weight gain for the baby and a diagnosis of IUGR was made. Later, it was found that her baby's blood flow was extremely low. Dr. Ricky explained everything in detail to Mrs. A and her husband and with their consent she was posted for emergency LSCS. She gave birth to a male baby weighing 945 gm via caesarean section on 19 November 2025. Mrs. A gestational age was 32+2 weeks. The baby had to be admitted in our nursery for many days due to prematurity and very low birth weight. Initially, the baby had grunting and was in distress, but settled. Later, the child developed apnoeic episodes. Dr. Ricky explained the baby's condition to the parents and referred him to AIIMS in Raibareli. We all prayed for the baby and by the grace of God the baby received good care. As a result, the baby's weight increased from 945 gm to 1.4 kg and then to 2 kg. After one month, the baby was discharged in good health. We thank God for A and her baby as His mercy kept them safe. As of 15/06/26, the baby's weight is 4.5 kg and he is very active.

## RADIOLOGY DEPARTMENT REPORT

### ***Dr. John P. Selvam***



By the abundant grace of God, the Radiology Department was privileged to serve patients faithfully throughout the year 2025–2026. During this period, we performed 3,049 ultrasound examinations, including several ultrasound-guided aspiration procedures, providing valuable support in diagnosis, patient management, and treatment planning. Most referrals came from the Departments of Obstetrics & Gynaecology, General Medicine, and Palliative Care, highlighting the important role of radiology services in the hospital's multidisciplinary approach to healthcare. Compared to the previous year, there was a steady increase in the number of ultrasound studies performed, reflecting growing confidence in our diagnostic services and an increasing demand from the community we serve.

We remain grateful to God for His guidance, protection, and provision throughout the year. We also sincerely appreciate the support of our clinicians, nursing staff, and hospital administration, whose teamwork and dedication enabled us to provide accurate, timely, and compassionate diagnostic care to our patients.

### **Enhancing Patient Experience Through Process Improvement:**

BCH launched a patient experience improvement initiative focused on reducing patient turnaround time (TAT), enhancing OPD efficiency, increasing patient footfall, and supporting the hospital's long-term sustainability.

#### **Understanding our patient population**

Patients who are unable to afford even basic healthcare expenses often seek treatment in government facilities, while those with greater financial means may prefer corporate hospitals offering premium amenities and services.

This leaves mission hospitals in urban areas primarily serving the middle-income population—patients who can either afford reasonable healthcare expenses or obtain reimbursement through their employers or insurance schemes.

Therefore, our focus should be on delivering accessible, efficient, and high-quality healthcare services that meet the expectations of this patient group. In the past, mission hospitals were often valued because alternatives were limited and government healthcare services were inadequate. Today, however, patients have more choices than ever before, and gratitude alone cannot be the basis of patient loyalty.

To meet patient expectations and retain their trust, we must focus on delivering efficient systems, reducing waiting times, providing compassionate care, and ensuring a consistently positive patient experience. Patient loyalty is earned not only through our values and mission but also through the quality, convenience, and reliability of the services we provide.

## OPD Patient Audit

To better understand patient flow and identify opportunities to improve patient experience, an OPD patient audit was conducted using data extracted from the Hospital Management System (HMS). The audit provided valuable insights into patient turnaround time (TAT) and overall service efficiency. A total of 1,100 patients visited the OPD during the month.

The analysis revealed that the average patient turnaround time (TAT) was 1 hour and 56 minutes.

Approximately 59% of patients completed their hospital visit within 2 hours, while 41% spent more than 2 hours in the hospital. Notably, nearly 10% of patients remained in the hospital for more than 4 hours during their visit. Although most patients completed their visit within a reasonable timeframe, the audit identified opportunities to streamline patient flow and enhance service delivery. The findings informed targeted initiatives to reduce waiting times, improve operational efficiency, and strengthen the overall patient experience.

### Rationale for the Initiative

Mission hospitals are widely trusted for their ethical practices, affordability, and patient-centred values. However, patients often experience dissatisfaction due to long waiting times, inefficient processes, and fragmented service delivery.

Corporate hospitals, on the other hand, have invested heavily in streamlined systems and patient convenience, resulting in a more efficient patient experience.

BCH aims to combine the strengths of both models by preserving its mission-driven values while implementing efficient, patient-friendly systems that improve the overall patient journey.

### Actions Implemented

To reduce patient waiting times and improve operational efficiency, BCH introduced a daily 15-minute OPD coordination meeting involving key departments. These meetings focus on improving patient flow, strengthening inter-departmental coordination, identifying and resolving process bottlenecks, and reducing patient turnaround time. The initiative aims to create a more organized, predictable, and patient-friendly OPD experience.

### Future Plans

The next phase of the initiative will focus on staff and patient engagement. Feedback will be collected from OPD and other BCH staff to identify challenges and opportunities for improvement, followed by the implementation of practical system enhancements. Structured patient feedback will also be introduced to better understand patient expectations and experiences, ensuring that future improvements remain patient-centered.

### Expected Outcomes

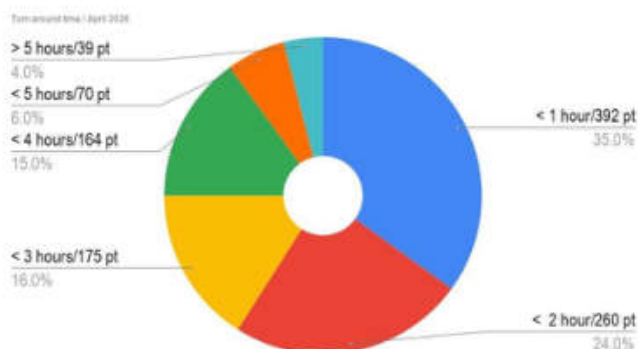

### **BROKEN YET HEALED IN HIS NAME!**

It was on one of my duty days that 37-year-old Mrs. Y first walked into our casualty with bleeding for almost a month and severe abdominal pain. She was accompanied by her sister who kept telling us that one of the

main reasons they came in at such an odd hour during the night was because of their trust in our hospital built over the years. After her first LSCS in 2009, she had undergone an emergency surgery 7 years later for an ectopic. She didn't remember the exact details, but was immensely grateful for the care that they had received here. After the initial reports showed urinary infection and positive urine pregnancy test, I requested for an emergency scan. Since the report seemed more like a complete abortion than what I feared (a recurrent ectopic), I reassured them and offered conservative management.

Prior to her discharge, Mrs. Y was advised to follow up with a repeat beta HCG report as her symptoms were not fully relieved. The next OPD day, Mrs. Y calmly walked into the consultation room claiming that she had continued pain in her lower abdomen with controlled yet persistent bleeding. As I advised her to wait for the report, she walked off to give her blood sample. Minutes later, our staff ran to inform that she couldn't stand and was in severe pain. They assessed her, and found that she was hypotensive. But when I rushed to check on her, she was sweating and so was I....we rushed her for an emergency scan which gave us the complete picture of a ruptured ectopic and hemoperitoneum! Within minutes, we had to convince the confused yet compliant relatives for an immediate laparotomy. They preferred to do the emergency surgery here (despite the limitations in our blood bank facilities) in the name of their "trust". As the staff rushed to the patient's bedside to do the basic resuscitation and preoperative measures, I silently wished that one of our senior consultants was not on leave at this time. But that's when I remembered Zechariah 4:6 (*Not by might, nor by power, but by my Spirit, says the Lord of hosts*). So, I decided that's the helpline that I would seek right now. The relatives were panicking, yet continued to support us graciously through the process. We kept reassuring them although our hearts were pacing but trusting in our Master's hand.

During the surgery, I couldn't help but just thank my God for many reasons. Firstly, for His timing that the patient should be kept stable and she would collapse in our hospital corridor rather than at home, so that she could get immediate medical intervention without any delay. The medical team were such a blessing with their commitment and availability despite several challenges. Beyond doubt, God was in charge of the entire surgery as He honoured their trust and protected her from other possible complications. This is one among several other testimonies which reminds me that

## PMR DEPARTMENT REPORT



### ***Dr. Sherina J. Santhosh***

I am grateful to the Lord Almighty for enabling us to continue our rehabilitation services throughout the year. The PMR Department provides approximately 300–350 physiotherapy sessions every month, of which nearly 75% are for children. We catered to patients with musculoskeletal disorders, spinal cord injuries, stroke, and children with cerebral palsy, sequelae of viral encephalitis and TB meningitis, genetic causes of global developmental delay, and autism spectrum disorders.

During the year, around 60 new children were enrolled, bringing the total number of children under our care to approximately 90. For children with autism, therapy sessions were initiated with the support of online consultations from an Occupational Therapist. On 14 November 2025, Children's Day was celebrated at our hospital with the participation of children with disabilities and their families, bringing joy, encouragement, and motivation to all involved. An aviary was also established in the Inclusive Play Area, and membership cards were issued to the children.

Our rehabilitation team consists of a PMR Consultant, Physiotherapist, Physiotherapy Technician, and two Community-Based Rehabilitation (CBR) workers. A community disability survey was initiated in March 2026 to identify individuals with disabilities in the community. Those identified through the survey were subsequently reached through Anganwadi-based camps and home visits conducted by the physiotherapist. Based on individualized rehabilitation plans, our CBR workers also began providing home-based therapy services, from which 16 patients are currently benefiting.

We thank God for His faithfulness and for the opportunity to serve children and adults with disabilities, helping them achieve greater independence and improved quality of life.

By the grace of God, the Dental Department at Broadwell Christian Hospital continued to grow and serve the community during the year 2025–26. After remaining closed for more than a year, the department was reopened on 1st October 2023. The initial months were challenging, but through awareness activities and community engagement, patient attendance gradually increased as trust in our services was restored. A unique aspect of our work is our close collaboration with the Palliative Care Team. Through weekly village outreach visits, we provide oral healthcare to patients who are unable to access regular dental services. During these visits, we conduct oral cancer screening, tobacco cessation counselling, oral health education, and early detection of dental diseases. These initiatives help improve oral health awareness and ensure timely treatment for people living in rural communities.

We are grateful for the continued support of Dr. Vivek Singh Chauhan, whose oncology services play a vital role in the early diagnosis and management of oral and other cancers in the region.

This year also marked an important milestone with the addition of Dr. Mekha K. Lazarus to the Dental Department. Her dedication and clinical expertise have strengthened our services and improved patient care, allowing us to expand both hospital-based and community outreach activities.

We are also thankful for the introduction of Dental Implant Services, which provide patients with improved function, confidence, and quality of life through advanced dental care.

# PALLIATIVE CARE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The Palliative Care Department at Broadwell Christian Hospital, Fatehpur, continues to serve patients and families with compassionate, holistic care. What began as a small initiative in 2012 has grown into an important community-based healthcare service reaching some of the most vulnerable people in the region.

Our Journey- The department was established under the guidance of Dr. Ann Thyle and later strengthened and expanded through the leadership of Dr. Sunitha Varghese. Their dedication helped build a strong foundation for palliative care services in Fatehpur.

Our Mission- We care for patients suffering from advanced illnesses, chronic pain, disability, cancer, and other life-limiting conditions. Our goal is not only to treat symptoms but also to restore dignity, provide comfort, and bring hope to patients and their families.

Reaching the Unreached- Our team regularly travels to remote villages to care for patients who cannot reach healthcare facilities. Many patients come to us with advanced diseases, especially oral cancers related to tobacco use. Through pain management, counselling, nursing care, and spiritual support, we strive to improve their quality of life.

Compassion Beyond Medicine- Palliative care is more than medical treatment. Many patients face loneliness, neglect, and emotional distress. A listening ear, kind words, and compassionate presence often bring healing and comfort beyond medicines.

Growth and Expansion- With support from the Azim Premji Foundation (APF) Project, the department has expanded its services and strengthened its multidisciplinary team, including:

- Doctors
- Nurses
- Nurse Assistants
- Counsellors
- Drivers
- Project Officer

This team-based approach helps us address the physical, emotional, social, and spiritual needs of our patients.

### **Community Outreach**

- Regular home visits across multiple development blocks.
- Dedicated vehicles for patient care and outreach.
- Active involvement of ASHA workers for early identification and referral of patients.
- Increased community awareness and follow-up care.

### **Looking Ahead**

# Testimony:

## *A Journey of Relief, Acceptance, and Dignity*

### Background

Mr. Brajesh, a 46-year-old man from Tiwaripur Block, Bhitaura, District Fatehpur, was diagnosed with carcinoma of the lower alveolus. He was receiving treatment at JK Cancer Hospital, Kanpur, where he underwent two cycles of chemotherapy. On 11 July 2025, he was enrolled in the palliative care program of Broadwell Christian Hospital, Fatehpur. At the time of enrollment, he was experiencing severe pain with a pain score of 9/10 and was also suffering from constipation. Due to fear and misconceptions that the disease might spread to them, his family members had isolated him in a separate room.

### Intervention

The palliative care team conducted weekly home visits to assess his condition and provide comprehensive support. Counseling sessions were held with his wife and other family members regarding the nature of his illness, wound care management, and the correct administration of oral morphine for pain control. Morphine therapy was initiated according to his pain requirements, and supportive measures were provided for constipation management. The team also encouraged family participation in his care and provided hands-on training to his wife in wound dressing techniques.

### Outcome

Following the initiation of morphine therapy, Mr. Brajesh's pain gradually reduced, resulting in improved comfort and quality of life. Through regular counseling and education, family members developed a better understanding of his condition and overcame their fears regarding disease transmission. His wife gained confidence in providing wound care and became actively involved in his day-to-day care at home. Although Mr. Brajesh eventually lost the ability to speak, he continued to communicate effectively by writing down his concerns and needs.

### Impact

Mr. Brajesh was a humble and respectful individual who left a lasting impression on the palliative care team. The intervention not only improved his symptom control but also transformed the family's attitude towards his illness, leading to compassionate and dignified care during his final months. Mr. Brajesh passed away on 02 January 2026. Following his death, the palliative care team conducted post-bereavement follow-up visits to provide emotional support and counseling to his family during their period of grief.



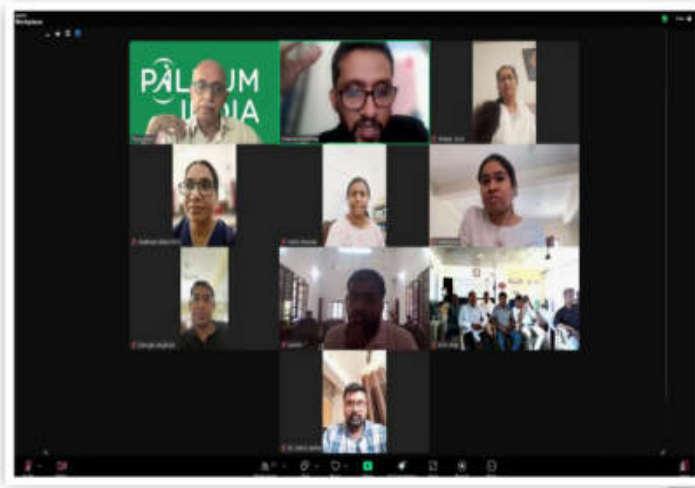

#### **Summary**

I thank God for giving me the opportunity to work as a Biomedical Engineer at BCH. The department maintains a complete inventory register and unique inventory ID for all medical equipment. At present, the hospital has 301 medical equipment assets, and all records are regularly updated.

#### **Maintenance Performance**

This year, 60% of the scheduled Preventive Maintenance (PM) was completed. The remaining 40% is planned to be completed within the next three months. A daily complaint register is maintained by the department, and most breakdown calls are attended promptly. In cases where spare parts are unavailable or specialized service is required, the respective equipment manufacturer is contacted to minimize equipment downtime.

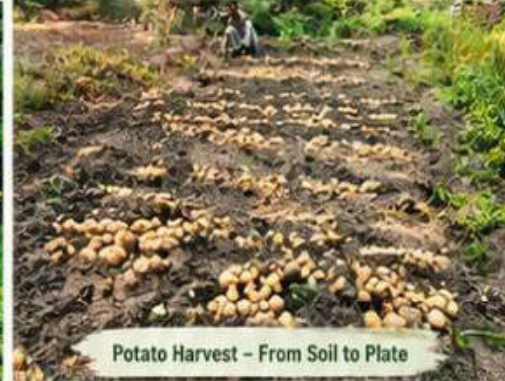

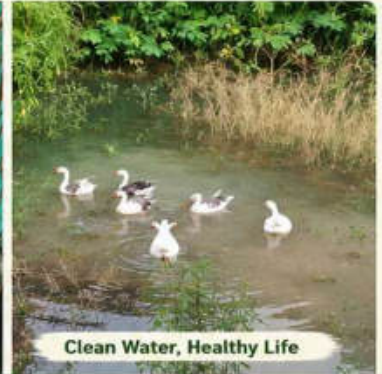

# MOTHER & CHILD HIGH RISK CLINIC

We were able to conduct PMSMA clinics on the scheduled days in various PHCs over the last one year. Specialist consultation was provided for high-risk pregnancy cases through the support of our gynecologist. We strengthened our collaboration with Government PHCs, ASHA workers, ANM staff, and Anganwadi workers for better patient identification and follow-up. We also organized awareness sessions on maternal health, nutrition, safe motherhood, and early warning signs during pregnancy and encouraged institutional deliveries and timely referrals for complicated cases. We were also able to maintain regular communication with community health workers to track vulnerable mothers. We offered counselling and emotional support to mothers and families to alleviate emotional suffering because of anxiety, fears, adjustment issues and so on. We conducted outreach visits to underserved villages to improve access to healthcare services and continued serving needy patients with compassion and commitment despite resource limitations.

# DISABILITY CLINIC

Our Community Based Inclusive Development (CBID) program actively works in the villages of Teliyani Block to identify and support persons with disabilities. Two CBID workers regularly visit the villages and collect information about individuals who may require medical, rehabilitative, or supportive care. Twice every month, our PMR Consultant and Physiotherapist conduct outreach visits to nearby Anganwadi centers, where patients are examined, diagnosed, and assessed for their treatment and rehabilitation needs. Based on the condition of the patient, an appropriate care plan is decided. Patients who are able to travel are provided with treatment and rehabilitation services at the hospital. For those who are unable to come due to physical limitations or other difficulties, our team provides home-based care and physiotherapy services at their residences, ensuring that no patient is deprived of proper treatment and support.

# SCHOOL WELLNESS CLINIC

The School Wellness Program successfully expanded its reach to 32 government and private schools, creating a strong platform for promoting student health and well-being. Through various health initiatives, the program has directly benefited 5,380 students, helping them develop healthier lifestyles and greater awareness of personal health. A series of wellness activities were conducted to support the overall physical, mental, and social well-being of students. Health and hygiene awareness sessions encouraged positive habits and preventive healthcare practices, while dental screening camps enabled the early identification and management of oral health issues.

The program also fostered active participation from parents and teachers through interactive discussions and awareness sessions, strengthening the support system around children. These combined efforts have contributed significantly to creating healthier school environments and promoting long-term wellness among students and their communities.

## OUTREACH CAMPS (URBAN & RURAL)

Organized health camps within the hospital premises and in surrounding villages in collaboration with the District Health Society (DHS). These camps were focused on promoting equitable and accessible healthcare services for underserved and marginalized communities. We reached individuals and families facing barriers to timely and quality healthcare access and provided preventive, promotive, and basic curative healthcare services at the community level. The staff conducted health screenings and early detection activities for various illnesses and also created awareness through health education sessions and community interaction. Timely referrals to higher healthcare centers for advanced treatment were facilitated when required. In doing so, we addressed unmet healthcare needs by bringing essential medical services closer to people's homes. We were also able to increase awareness regarding available government and hospital-based healthcare services.

# TB NUTRITION

The TB Nutrition Kit Distribution Program was launched to support tuberculosis patients from marginalized and economically disadvantaged communities, recognizing the critical role of proper nutrition in successful treatment and recovery. The initiative was first introduced in the Teliyani and Asothar blocks, where 50 TB patients from each block were adopted for sustained nutritional support.

Under this program, nutrition kits were provided regularly over a period of six months, ensuring that beneficiaries received consistent dietary assistance throughout their treatment journey. The nutritional support contributed to improved immunity, enhanced physical strength, better overall nutritional status, and faster recovery during TB treatment.

Most beneficiaries belonged to underprivileged families who faced significant challenges in maintaining adequate nutrition during long-term medical care. Beyond addressing nutritional needs, the initiative promoted hope, dignity, and compassionate care for vulnerable individuals and families. By combining healthcare with nutritional support, the program helped ensure that no TB patient was left behind on the path to recovery and improved quality of life.

## COMMUNITY INSTITUTION:

The JSS Foundation course for Health Assistant Course was a 3-month skill development program specially designed for underprivileged village girls from marginalized communities. The course focused on empowering young women who had completed at least 8th standard but were unable to continue higher education due to financial or social challenges, yet had a strong desire to learn, work, and support their livelihood. As part of this initiative, our team actively identified deserving candidates from villages and encouraged them to participate in the program. A total of 20 students were given the opportunity to receive healthcare-related training and practical exposure through this course. The program not only provided knowledge and skills but also opened doors for employment and self-confidence among these young women. After successful completion of the course, we were able to provide in-house employment opportunities to 6 students, helping them begin a stable and meaningful career journey. This initiative is expected to create a lasting positive impact on village girls by promoting education, skill development, financial independence, and social empowerment within the community. Building on the success of this program, the next batch will begin with a 5-month Garbhini Mitra course for another group of 20 students. This upcoming program aims to further strengthen maternal and community healthcare support while continuing to empower young women from underserved communities.

Many started knitting after a gap of 15 years. Hospital souvenirs for our well-wishers are usually made by our ladies. Knitting is a highly therapeutic and productive hobby for women. It acts as an active meditation, using repetitive motions to lower stress, reduce anxiety, and release feel-good brain chemicals like dopamine. Beyond mental well-being, it keeps the mind sharp, improves hand dexterity, and results in a tangible sense of accomplishment. Studies suggest that regular crafting, such as knitting, stimulates neural pathways, helps preserve memory, and can delay cognitive decline. Finishing a project—whether it is a simple scarf or a complex sweater—generates a deep sense of pride, boosting overall self-esteem.



## SAMAY KA DAAN for SHRAMDAAN:
